Dr. LeMia Jenkins is a strategic public affairs and communications executive who serves as President of Brownkey Consulting Group which works with companies across the globe specializing in public affairs, strategic communications, marketing, business development, and strategy. Previously, Jenkins served as the first-ever Chief Public Affairs & Sustainability Officer and Chief Communications Officer at Pinterest.

Prior to Pinterest, Jenkins was the Director of Global Communications and Media Relations for Walmart and the Director of External Affairs for Caesars Entertainment. Earlier in her career, she served as Communications Director for the Hillary for America campaign and as the first Director of Federal Relations for Jackson State University, following her work as a senior communications and policy strategist for several Members of Congress.



As an influential expert and leader, Jenkins has received a number of awards and recognitions across the industry for her work. In 2021, PR Week recognized her as one of the industry's "In-House Elites" and one of the year's "Women to Watch" honorees. She was also a featured speaker at Fortune's Most Powerful Women Summit and named one of Essence's 8 Black Women to Watch in Corporate America.

Jenkins holds a Bachelor of Arts in Public Relations from Tougaloo College and earned a Master of Public Health (Marketing and Health Communications) from The George Washington University. She has studied Healthcare at the Hebrew University in Israel and has a Doctorate in Education from the University of Mississippi.

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






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
