Prior to Pinterest, Jenkins was the Director of Global Communications and Media Relations for Walmart and the Director of External Affairs for Caesars Entertainment. Earlier in her career, she served as Communications Director for the Hillary for America campaign and as the first Director of Federal Relations for Jackson State University, following



her work as a senior communications and policy strategist for several Members of Congress.

As an influential expert and leader, Jenkins has received a number of awards and recognitions across the industry for her work. In 2021, PR Week recognized her as one of the industry's "In-House Elites" and one of the year's "Women to Watch" honorees. Dr. Jackson founded EduCare Training and Consulting, LLC through a purpose of pouring into those who pour out so much. Much of her work is specifically focused on equipping and refreshing educators. 


Dr. Almesha Campbell, Vice President for Research and Economic Development, Jackson State

Dr. Amanda Sams Bradshaw is an assistant professor of integrated marketing








Her career as an educator has brought her great fulfillment, and she believes her work with community colleges has been the most important work of her life.
